

AUTHOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- Authors should present a precise and accurate account of the research performed and a clear, objective discussion of its significance. Authors should prepare the article following the manuscript preparation guidelines.
- Authors should avoid unnecessary fragmentation or redundant publication of research with the sole objective of increasing the number of publications.
- When submitting a corrected version of a manuscript after a round of reviews, the Authors must indicate as clear as possible all the changes introduced in the manuscript and how these changes address the points raised by the reviewers.
- All Authors should have made substantial contributions to all of the following: (1) the conception and design of the study, or acquisition of data, or analysis and interpretation of data, (2) drafting the article or revising it critically for important intellectual content, (3) final approval of the version to be submitted.
- A manuscript can be submitted to the journal only if all the significant contributors have been included as Co-authors. All Co-authors have revised the manuscript before submission and agree on the main conclusions and statements included in the manuscript. All Co-authors have to be informed about the submission of the manuscript to Meteorologica.
- The submission of a revised manuscript is expected only if the Authors have satisfactorily addressed all comments, and if the revised manuscript meets the standards of Meteorologica. In case of doubt, the Authors shall consult the Editor.
- All previous works that have motivated the authors' work must be cited in the manuscript. Personal conversations, correspondence, material available to the authors through peer reviewing of articles or projects cannot be included in the manuscript without previous authorization of the investigators involved in these activities.
- Authors must avoid plagiarism (see below) and self-plagiarism (see below). This applies to text and / or figures.
- Authors must avoid fabrication and falsification of data and / or results. Intentional fabrication or falsification of data when detected will lead to the rejection of the paper. If the paper has been already accepted a retraction might be requested.
- Authors should avoid publishing essentially the same research to more than one peer-reviewed journal.

- Authors should avoid including any kind of offensive material in the submitted manuscripts. Offensive material include (but is not restricted to) personal criticism, offensive language and statements that can be interpreted as discriminatory.
- The Authors are requested to identify who provided financial support for the conduct of the research and/or preparation of the article.
- The corresponding Author, must ensure that all coauthors are fully cognizant of the steps and changes in the manuscript during the peer review process.
